#### **Notice of Motion: Private Business**

- 1. The Hon. I. Pnevmatikos to move That this Council -
  - I. Notes that Sunday 25 November marks the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women;
  - II. Notes the unacceptable, shocking and persistent prevalence of violence against women across the globe; and
  - III. Commits to do all that it can to address gender inequality, to empower women and girls and to prevent violence against women.
- 2. The Hon. J.M.A. Lensink to move That the Interim Report of the Joint Committee on the 125th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage, be noted.
- 3. The Hon. T. A. Franks to move That this Council -
  - I. Notes that SHINE SA provides vital services to people who are often in difficult circumstances seeking a safe place for sexual health support, testing and counselling;
  - II. Condemns the Marshall Government's 2018-19 Budget cuts to SHINE SA which will have a detrimental impact on the reproductive and sexual health of our community;
  - III. Recognises that over 350 doctors have signed a letter urging the Government to reverse these cuts:
  - IV. Expresses concern that these cuts could lead to an increase in rates of sexually transmitted infections, unplanned pregnancies, and an increase in the use of hospital obstetricians and gynaecologists; and
  - V. Urges the Marshall Liberal Government to restore funding to SHINE SA.
- 4. The Hon. I. K. Hunter to move That this Council -
  - I. That a Select Committee of the Legislative Council be established to inquire into and report on a redeveloped Adelaide Oval, with particular reference to: -
    - (a) The economic and financial benefits of the redevelopment of Adelaide Oval, including to whom the benefits are accruing:
    - (b) The operations and financial management of the Adelaide Oval;
    - (c) The corporate governance of the Oval, including the Stadium Management Authority;
    - (d) The financial returns to the South Australian National Football League, the South Australian Cricket Association, and the Adelaide and Port Adelaide Football Clubs;
    - (e) The financial contributions into the Oval infrastructure and into the broader sporting community from the Oval's operations;
    - (f) The proposed hotel development at the Adelaide Oval, and the process by which the Government considered the proposal and approved financing the proposed hotel development;
    - (g) The impacts on the hotel industry in Adelaide of the proposed hotel development;
    - (h) The legislative, regulatory and other legal frameworks governing the operations of the Adelaide Oval, and any opportunities for improvement;
    - (i) The impact of the Oval and its operations on the surrounding parklands and the legislative, regulatory and other legal frameworks governing further development in the parklands; and
    - (i) Any other related matters;
  - II. That Standing Order No. 389 be so far suspended as to enable the Chairperson of the Committee to have a deliberative vote only.
  - III. That this Council permits the Select Committee to authorise the disclosure or publication, as it sees fit, of any evidence or documents presented to the Committee prior to such evidence being presented to the Council.

- IV. That Standing Order No. 396 be suspended to enable strangers to be admitted when the Select Committee is examining witnesses unless the Committee otherwise resolves, but they shall be excluded when the Committee is deliberating.
- 5. The Hon. C. M. Scriven to move That this Council -
  - I. Notes that a recent Federal fund for drug and alcohol treatment services is not open to services in the South East of South Australia;
  - II. Expresses its dismay that the South East has been excluded from the opportunity to apply for this Federal funding;
  - III. Calls on the South Australian Health Minister to stand up for the residents of Mount Gambier, Millicent, Naracoorte, Bordertown and the rest of the South East and demand from his Federal Liberal counterpart that the South East not be abandoned; and
  - IV. Calls on the South Australian Health Minister to demand that the Federal Liberal Government reverses its decision to disregard the South East, and opens the applications process to the South East, including extending the deadline for applications beyond the current date of 20 December 2018 if necessary.
- 6. The Hon. C. Bonaros to move That this Council -
  - I. Notes that -
    - (a) 19 September 2018 marked the 125th anniversary of women's suffrage in New Zealand;
    - (b) On 19 September 1893 the Electoral Act 1893 was passed giving all women over 21 in New Zealand the right to vote;
    - (c) As a result of this landmark legislation New Zealand became the first self-governing country in the world in which all women had the right to vote in parliamentary elections;
    - (d) On 28 November 1893 New Zealand women voted for the first time.
  - II. Congratulates New Zealand on marking the 125th anniversary of women's suffrage in New Zealand.
  - III. Recognises the significant contribution women have made and continue to make in parliaments and the democratic process across the globe.

  - I. Notes that private health insurance is increasingly unaffordable for consumers;
  - II. Further notes that preferred provider schemes are not in the best interests of patients or providers receiving a lower rebate for the same treatment under the same policies;
  - III. Welcomes the recent decision of HBF to dismantle its long-standing preferred provider scheme;
  - IV. Acknowledges Recommendation 12 of the Senate Inquiry into the 'Value and affordability of private health insurance and out-of-pocket medical expenses' which recommends legislation to prohibit the practice of differential rebates for the same treatments; and

  - II. Acknowledges that, according to new guidelines for Europe published by the World Health Organisation, wind turbines can cause health problems if they result in people being exposed to excessive noise levels;
  - III. Further acknowledges that a Supreme Court-ordered report on the Bald Hills wind farm in Gippsland, Victoria found there was a nuisance under the Public Health and Wellbeing Act despite the wind farm being compliant with state planning laws;
  - IV. Further notes that a class-action lawsuit is now being prepared by local residents against the South Gippsland Council, the Victorian Government and the wind farm operator following the independent report;
  - V. Recognises that the core objective of the Environmental Protection Authority's 'Wind farms environmental noise guidelines' is "to balance the advantage of developing wind energy projects in South Australia with protecting the amenity of the surrounding community from adverse noise impact";
  - VI. Further recognises that the most recent State of the Environment Report (2013) by the South Australian EPA reported on the increase in noise complaints from existing wind farms, yet there has been no change to monitoring and compliance requirements; and
  - VII. Calls on the Government to place an urgent moratorium on approval or construction of any new windfarms until an independent full and thorough review is undertaken and an updated planning and compliance regime is implemented (October 24) (The Hon. D.G.E. Hood).
- 12. Adjourned debate on motion of the Hon. D.G.E. Hood That the Report of the Crime and Public Integrity Policy Committee on the Independent Commissioner Against Corruption (Investigative Powers) Amendment Bill, be noted (October 17) (The Hon. T. J. Stephens).
- 13. Adjourned debate on motion of the Hon. T. J. Stephens That the Annual Report of the Legislative Review Committee, 2017, be noted (October 17) (The Hon. J. E. Hanson).

  - III. Notes the key recommendation from the Nyland Royal Commission which recognised the substantial risk associated with staff working in single-handed shifts and recommended that single-handed shifts be abandoned; and

    - (b) Options available to both State and Local Government to alleviate any impact on SA Water and Local Government charges of these policies.
  - II. That, in the event of a Joint Committee being appointed, the Legislative Council be represented thereon by three Members, of whom two shall form a quorum of Council Members necessary to be present at all sittings of the Committee.
  - III. That this Council permits the Joint Committee to authorise the disclosure or publication, as it thinks fit, of any evidence or documents presented to the Committee prior to such evidence being reported to the Council.

- IV. That Standing Order No. 396 be suspended as to enable strangers to be admitted when the Joint Committee is examining witnesses unless the Committee otherwise resolves, but they shall be excluded when the Committee is deliberating.
